
## 4.6; Congress At Work - Making Laws

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## <u>Across</u>

1. An attempt made by congress to "talk the bill to death".

**4.** Aptly described the conference committees as a "Third house of Congress".

**9.** A proposed law presented to the house or senate for consideration.

**10.** A provision that will not normally pass on it's own, so it must piggyback on another provision

**12.** Bills that contain many smaller issues.

**13.** A limit to the debates.

**14.** Refusal by the president to sign a bill, returning it to the house.

**15.** Regularly referring to an adoption of a new law, or amendment to an existing rule.

**16.** Majority of the full membership of the house.

**17.** A senator known very well for his use of the filibuster, speaking for over 15 hours.

**2.** Deals with matters where the house and senate must work together, without a president's signature.

**3.** Enables members of the committee to push a bill onto the floor that has remained in committee for 30 days.

**5.** Set the individual record for a filibuster, talking for 24 hours and 18 minutes trying to deny the civil rights act of 1957.

**6.** Deals with unusual and temporary matters.

**7.** A bill that is buried, dies in committee.

**8.** A bill, printed in it's final form.

**11.** Congress may pass a bill overriding the president's veto.
