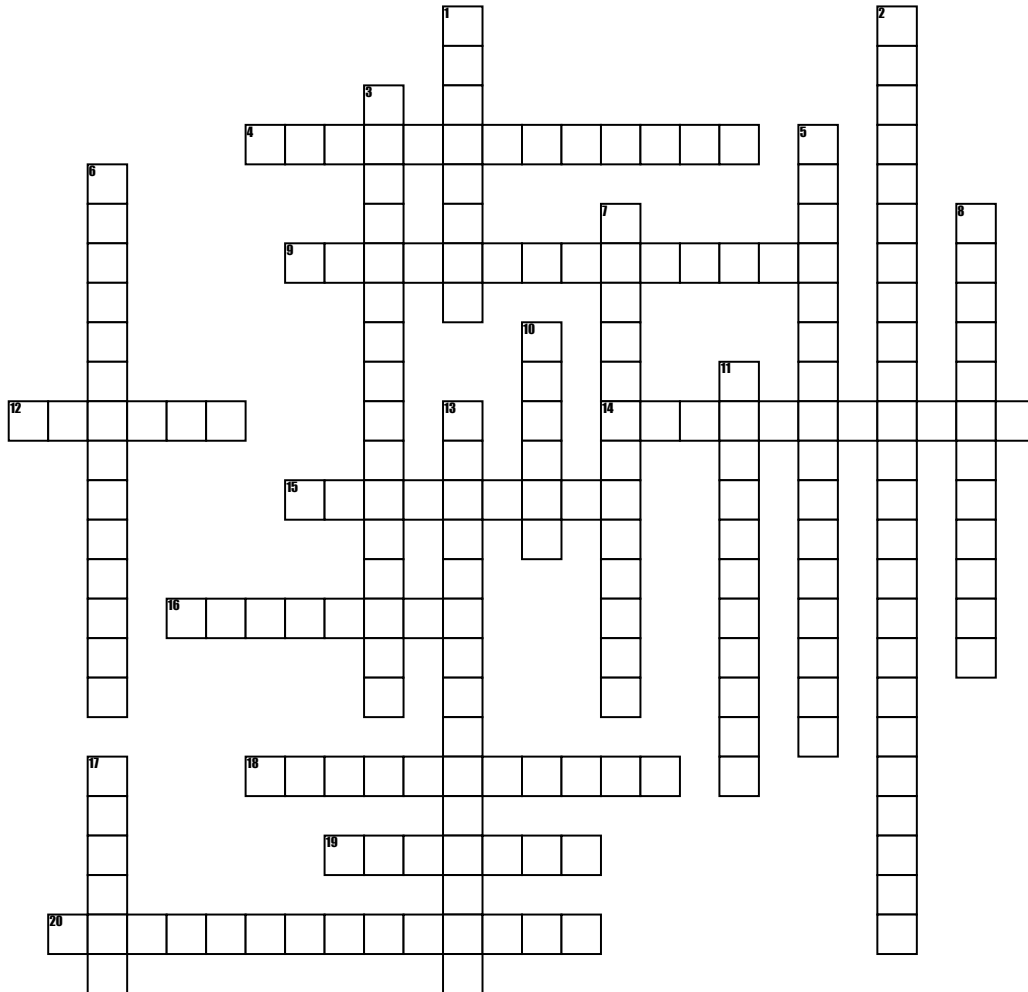

1. Aboriginal people living in the Maritime provinces today. Their lands once stretched along the banks of the St. John River (in present day New Brunswick and Maine) and extended as far west as the St. Lawrence.

2. He didn't support federal union in the beginning, but he changed his mind after the island faced bankruptcy. Born: 14.8.1826 Brudenell Point, Prince Edward Island. Died: 21.3.1912 in Ottawa Ontario

3. He was present at all three confederation conferences and fought in the Red River Resistance. Born: 25 January 1822 near York, Upper Canada. Died: 29 May 1905 Ottawa, Ontario.

5. A big trading company that was controlled by Britain.

6. He supported the confederation in New Brunswick and Quebec conferences. Born: May 20 1814 in Hillsborough, New Brunswick. Died on December 9th 1873 in Saint John, New Brunswick.

7. Was a participant in the conferences leading to the Canadian confederation. Born: November 10, 1811
