

- **4.** A type of fossil that is an extremely thin coating of carbon on rock. Forms when sediment buries an organism and materials that make up the organism become gases which leave carbon behind.
- 7. Method of determining the age of a fossil by comparing its placement with that of fossils in other layers of rock.
- **14.** Assigning an age to the Earth (4.6 billion years old) and landforms on the Earth through the use of two different methods relative dating and absolute dating.
- **15.** A fossil that is used to establish the age of rock layer because the fossil was distint, abundant, and widespread and the species that formed that fossil existed for only a short span of geologic time.

- **17.** A fossil that forms when the organisms or parts of organisms are prevented from decaying by being trapped in ice, tar, or amber.
- **18.** The time it takes for half of the radioactive atoms to decay.

- 1. A technique used to determine the actual age of a fossil on the basis of the amount of radioactive element it contains, as a result radioactive decay.
- **3.** A scientist who studies fossils to learn about organisms that lived long ago.
- **5.** The age of a rock compared to the ages of rock layers.
- A copy of an organism's shape created when minerals fill and harden inside a mold.

- **8.** A type of rock that forms when particles from other rocks or the remains of plants and animals are pressed and cemented together. Type of rock where fossils can be found.
- **9.** The breakdown of a radioactive element, releasing particles and energy.
- **10.** A fossil formed when minerals replace all or part of an organism.
- 11. Any indirect evidence of life preserved as an impression in rock, trails, footprints, burrows, and bite marks.
- **12.** A crablike invertebrate that is the most common fossil of the Cambrian Period, used as an index fossil.
- **13.** A fossil formed when an organism buried in sediment dissolves, leaving a hollow area.
- **16.** A preserved remnant or impression of an organism that lived in the past.
