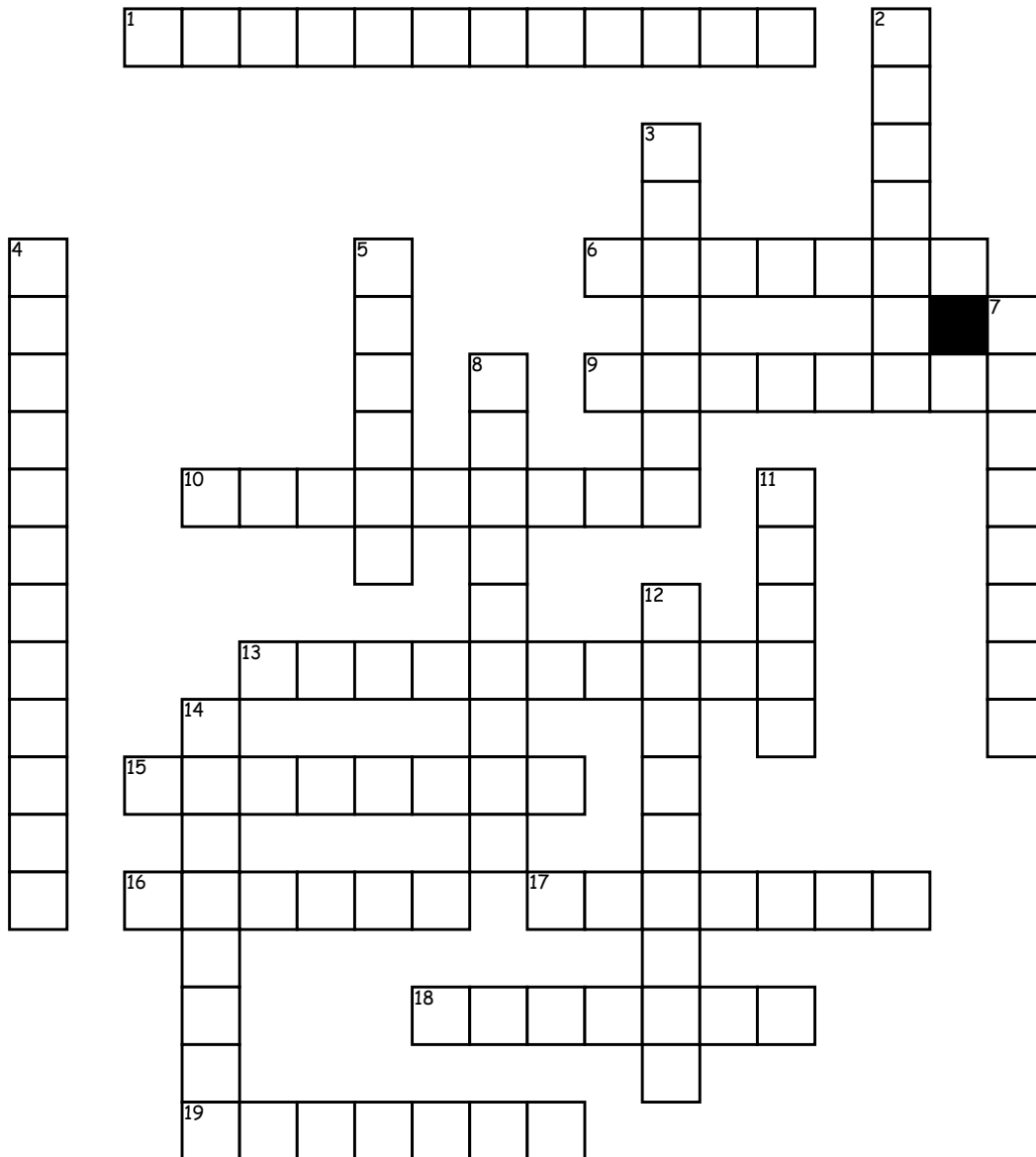

2. a military force that is raised from the civil population to supplement a regular army in an emergency.

4. restriction of interest to a narrow sphere; undue concern with local interests or petty distinctions at the expense of general well-being

5. a country or area under the full or partial political control of another country, typically a distant one, and occupied by settlers from that country.

8. a person who comes to live permanently in a foreign country.

11. a compulsory contribution to state revenue, levied by the government on workers' income and business profits or added to the cost of some goods, services, and transactions.

12. (in the period preceding and during the American Revolution) a member of a class of American militiamen who volunteered to be ready for service at a minute's notice.

14. a state in which supreme power is held by the people and their elected representatives, and which has an elected or nominated president rather than a monarch.
