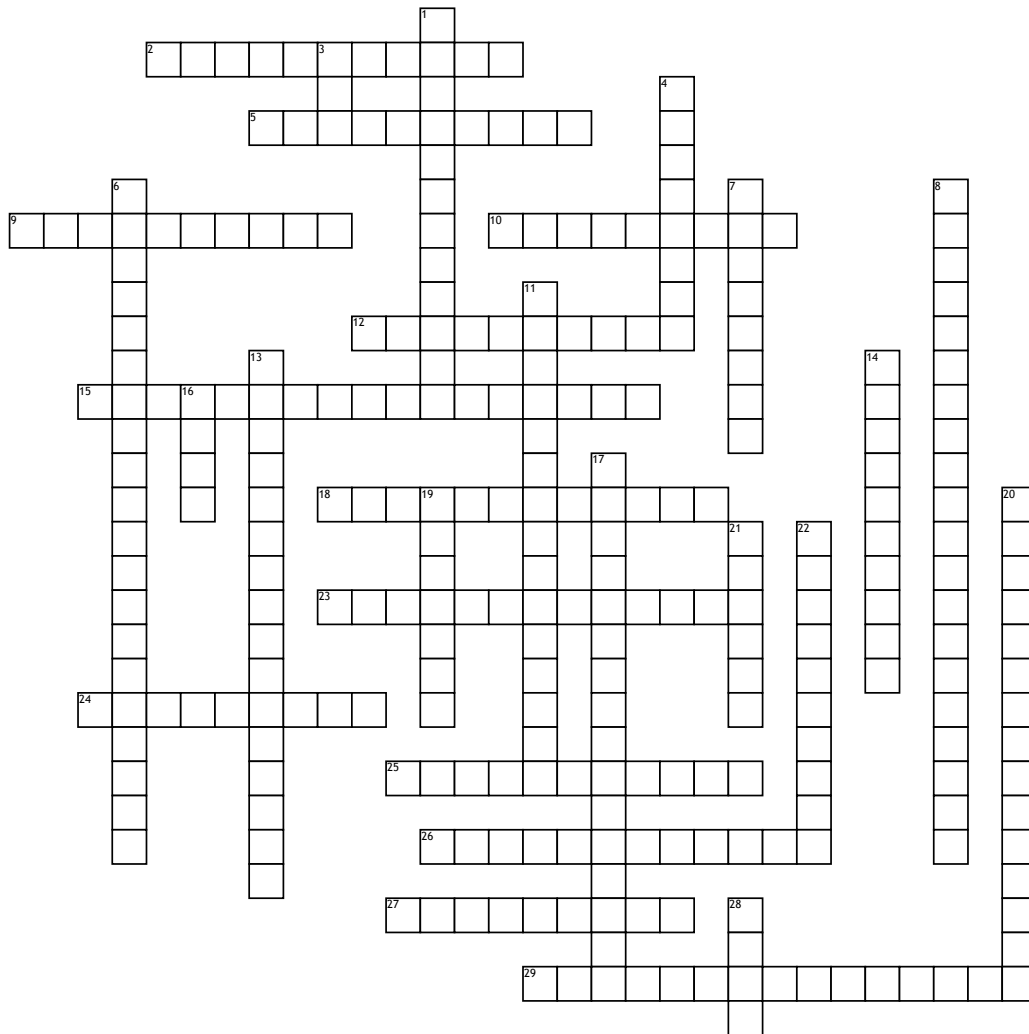

- 2. a vocational school, also called a trade school, is a higher-level learning institution that specializes in providing students with the vocational education and technical skills they need in order to perform the tasks of a particular job. Students typically earn a credential or a certificate
- 5. a feeling of enthusiasm, interest, or commitment that makes somebody want to do something, or something that causes such a feeling
- 9. a process or period in which something undergoes a change and passes from one state, stage, form, or activity to another
- 10. a contribution of free labor, usually to a non-profit organization
- 12. stage in economic cycle, relatively low unemployment and production begin to rise to normal levels after a slump
- 15. privately owned school that operates for profit for those seeking vocational training
- 18. economic activities belonging to or characteristic of a state
- 23. an academic degree from a college or university for those who complete at least one year of prescribed study beyond the bachelor's degree

- 25. Money awarded to students based on academic or other achievements to help pay for education expenses. Scholarships generally do not have to be repaid
- 26. Directed or guided by oneself, especially as an independent agent

- 14. a collection of colleges, has undergraduate programs which award bachelor degrees and graduate program for masters degrees and doctorates
- 16. a practice test that measures the critical thinking, mathematical reasoning, and writing skills that students need to do college-level work
- 17. Employee training at the place of work while he or she is doing the actual job
- 19. a sum of money charged for teaching or instruction by a school, college, or university
- 20. economic activities belonging to or characteristic of a nation
