

- 9. A law enacted in 1854 that establishes the territories of Kansas and Nebraska and gave their residents the right to decide whether to allow slavery
- 11. An Amendment to an 1846 military appropriation bill proposing that none of the territory acquired in the war of Mexico would be open to slavery
- 12. A best selling novel by Harriet Beecher Stowe's published in 1852 that portrayed slavery as a great moral evil

- 13. A political party formed in 1884 to opposed the extension of slavery into u.s territories
- **14.** The modern political party that was formed in 1854 by opponents of slavery in the territories
- 15. A series of congressional measures intended to settle the major disagreements between free states and slave states
- **16.** A name given to the American party formed in the 1850s to curtail the political influence of immigrants
