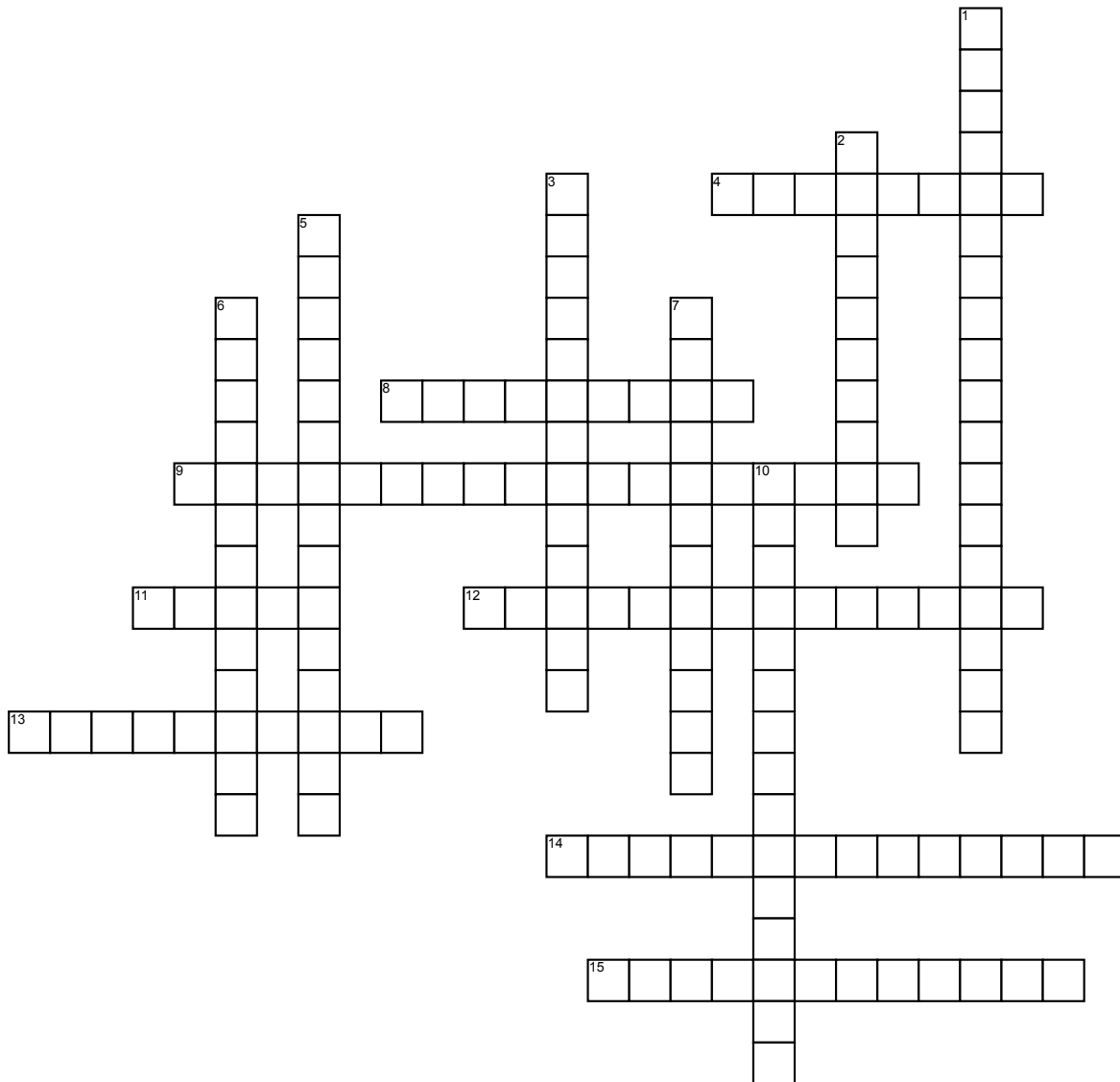

- 1.** Conflict in North America, lasting from 1754 to 1763 that was a part of a worldwide struggle between France and Britain and that ended with the defeat of France and the transfer of French Canada to Britain  
**2.** Series of laws enacted by parliament beginning in 1651 to tighten England's control of trade in its American colonies

- 3.** 18th-century intellectual movement that emphasized the use of reason and the scientific method as means of obtaining knowledge  
**5.** English policy of relaxing the enforcement of regulations in its colonies in return for the colonies continued economic loyalty  
**6.** Voyage that brought enslaved Africans to West Indies and later to North America  
**7.** Order in which Britain prohibited its American colonists from settling west of the Appalachian mountains  
**10.** Transatlantic system of trade in which goods and people including slaves, were exchanged between Africa, England, Europe, the West Indies, and the colonies in North America
