

- **5.** Advocated natural approaches to child rearing.
- **8.** Believed that every child is "smart" in his/her own way.
- **9.** Said children are born as blank tablets-believed children's experiences determine who they are.
- **11.** Promoted that the mother could best teach children (home schooling).
- **14.** Established the Ecological Approach-all children develop through many different environments.

- **15.** Believed in praising children's success, which supported his Hierarchy of Needs.
- **16.** Believed that children's personalities and social skills grow and develop in response to society's demands.
