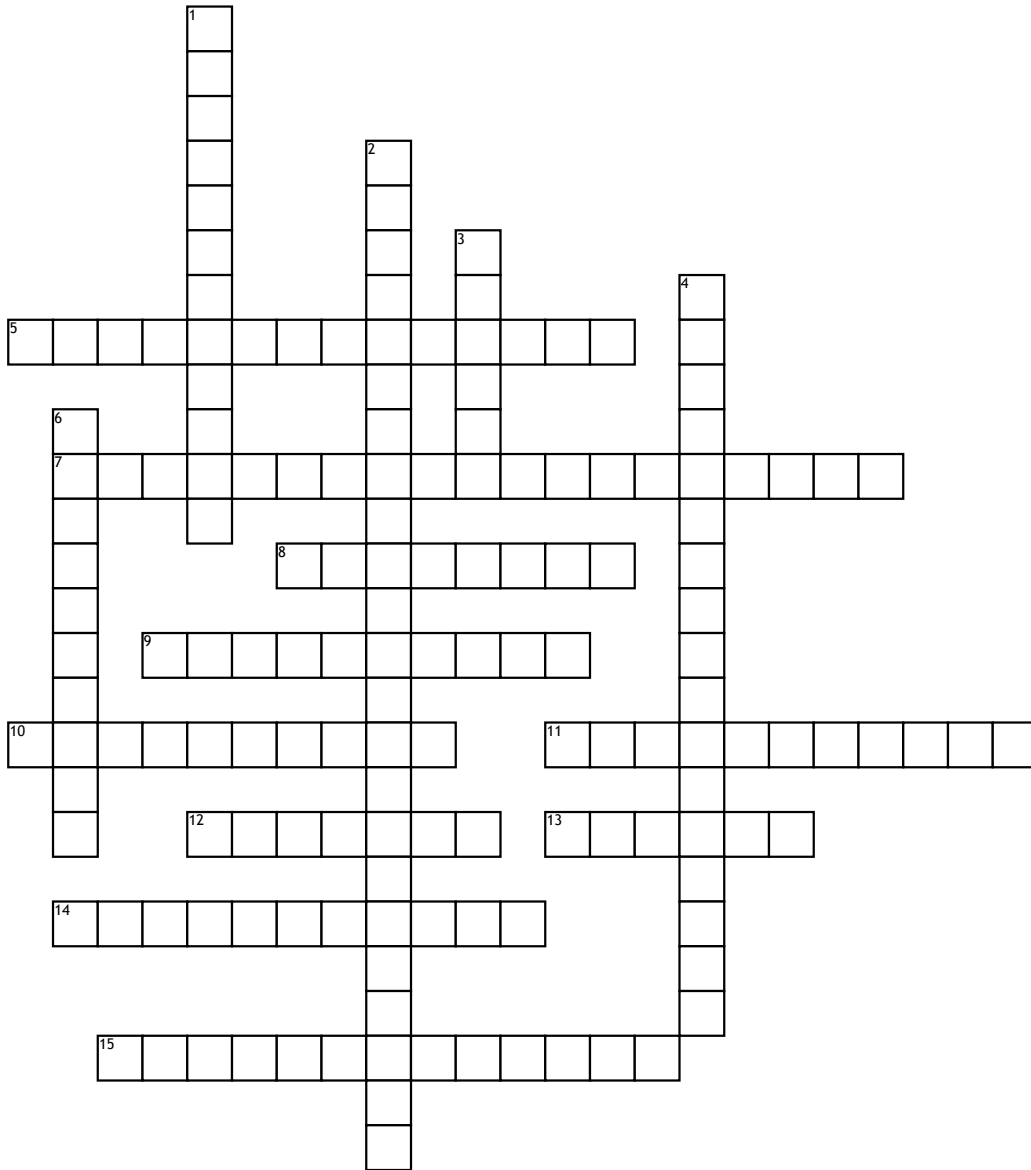


Civil Rights Movement

5. act of prejudice and/or racism
 7. a plan that took slaves to freedom states.
 8. in 1963, 200,000 people from all over the United States converged on Washington, DC to promote action on civil rights' issues.
 9. achieved without bloodshed
 10. laws passed in the South just after the Civil War aimed at controlling freedmen and enabling plantation owners to exploit African American workers
 11. the process of uniting or bringing together different ethnic groups

12. refusal to have commercial dealings with some organization
 13. Deeply rooted prejudice which may be expressed in the idea that one race is superior to another.
 14. the separation or isolation of a race, class, or ethnic group by enforced or voluntary residence in a restricted area
 15. The right to vote without poll tax.

1. in 1961, CORE organized a "Freedom Ride"—a bus trip to New Orleans—to test the recent Virginia court ruling that discrimination against interstate travelers in bus terminals was illegal.

2. Ruled that 'Separate but equal' as unconstitutional' after a girl was denied entry into a white girl school
 3. a form of civil disobedience in which demonstrators occupy seats and refuse to move
 4. nonviolent protests against unjust laws- boycotts, sit-ins and marches used by Martin Luther King to gain civil rights and end defector segregation
 6. a secret society created by white southerners in 1866 that used terror and violence to keep African Americans from obtaining their civil rights
