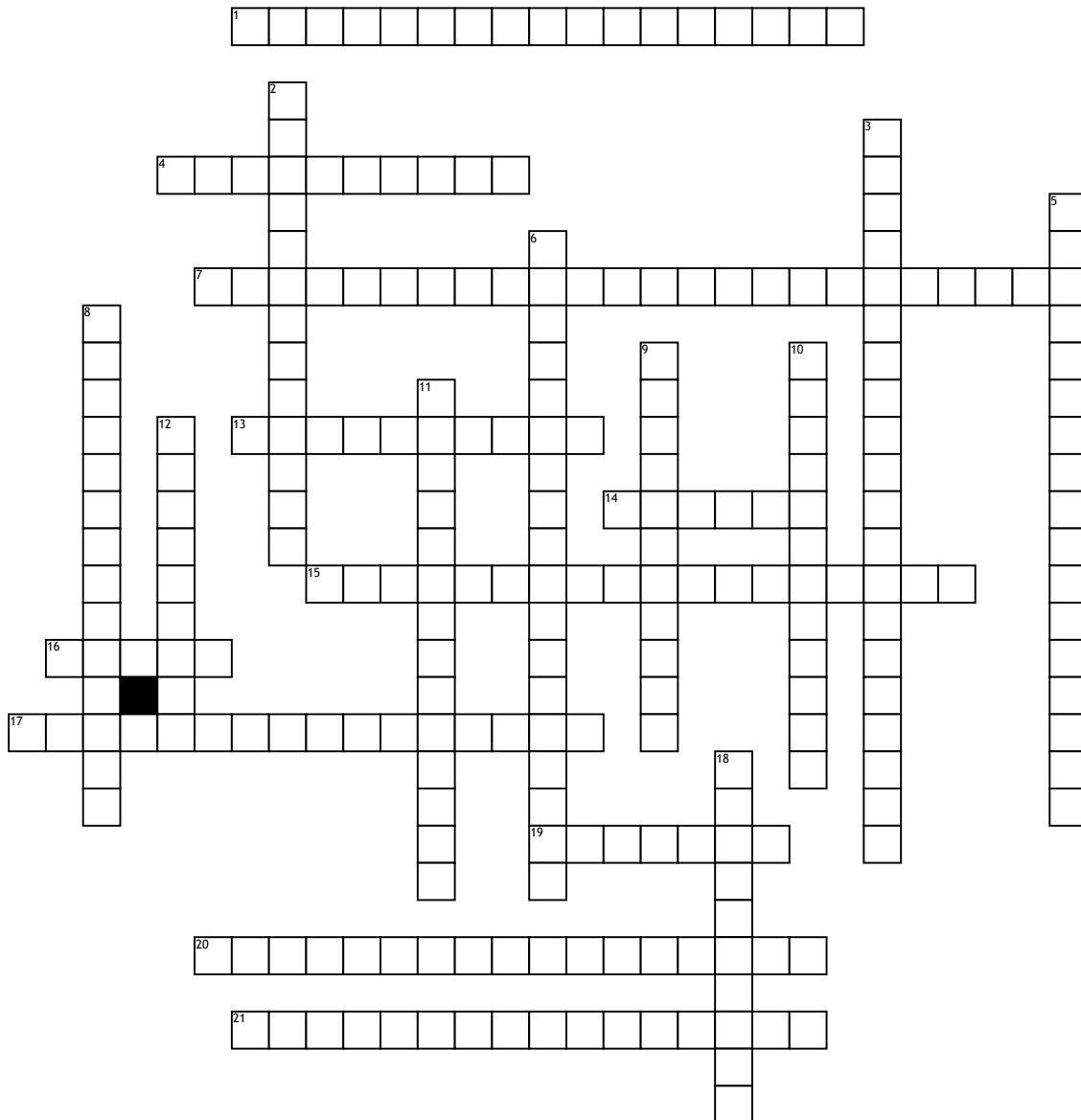

- 13. Rapid-fire gun capable of shooting 600 rounds per minute

- 15. Turning point of the Civil War that made it clear the North would win.
- 16. the United States (especially the northern states during the American Civil War)
- 17. General for the South; got his nickname because he refused to retreat during battle - he held his position like a stone wall

20. The fall of Vicksburg, Mississippi, to General Ulysses S. Grant's army on July 4th, 1863, after 48 days of seige.

6. A series of agreements passed by Congress in 1820-1821 to maintain the balance of power between slave states and free states

9. The southern states that seceded from the United States in 1861

10. Place in Virginia where John Brown led a raid on a federal arsenal

11. Novel written by Harriet Beecher Stowe that showed the horrors of slavery to Northerners

12. Device that allowed messages to be sent by wires over long distances *Helped Union send battle information
