

- 1. A doctrine in political theory that government is created by and subject to the will of the people.

- 6. The amendment in the us constitution that formally abolished slavery.
- 8. Laws that were designed to restrict and limit the freedom of freed African Americans to ensure their availability as a cheap labor force.
- 11. A white southerner who collaborated with the northern Republicans during the reconstruction, often for personal profit.
- **12.** A tax levied on every adult, without reference to income or resources, often there to restrict lower income voters.
