
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Common Literary Devices

- **3.** A brief, simple, or popular saying or phrase that gives advice and effectively embodies a commonplace truth based on practical experience or common sense. Also the name of a book in the Bible
- **5.** A world in which everything is imperfect, and everything goes terribly wrong. Ex.: Divergent; The Hunger Games
- 7. Polite, indirect expressions that replace words and phrases considered harsh and impolite, or which suggest something unpleasant. Ex.: "kick the bucket"
- **8.** An object or idea that repeats itself throughout a literary work

- **9.** A measuring unit in poetry made up of stressed and unstressed syllables
- **10.** An underlying meaning of a literary work, which may be stated directly or indirectly
- **12.** The use of symbols to signify ideas and qualities by giving them meanings that are different from their literal sense
- **13.** Makes a comparison between two things without using "like" or "as."
- **14.** A figure of speech that involves an exaggeration of ideas for the sake of emphasis
