
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## **Dramatic Elements**

- **3.** An introduction or preface, especially a poem recited to introduce a play
- **6.** A character briefly says something to him/herself or whispers to another character so other characters onstage can't hear

- **10.** An instruction written into the script of a play, indicating stage direction, movements of performers, or production requirements

**2.** A humorous character or incident in a serious literary work drama, especially a tragedy, intended to relive dramatic tension

- **4.** A flaw in the tragic hero of a tragedy that brings the tragic hero to ruin or sorrow; also known as tragic flaw
- **5.** Someone who's tragic flaw causes him/her to have a downfall and learn from the consequences of his/her actions
- 7. A character is talking to him/herself on stage, allowing the audience to access his/her thoughts
