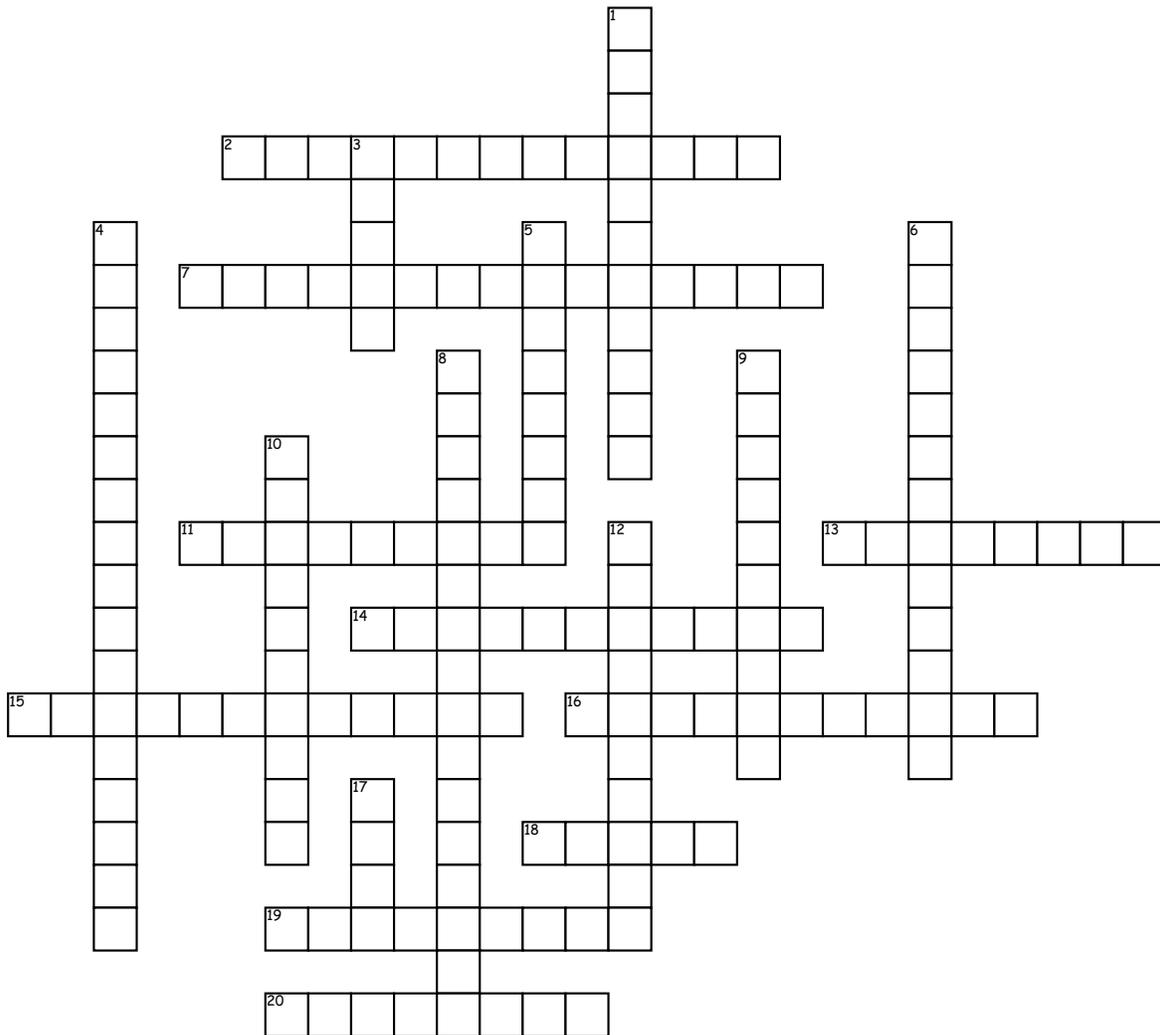

19. a person who is present at an event or incident but does not take part.

20. help given to a sick or injured person until full medical treatment is available.
