- 1. Taught drama at Bennett College and served as Directress of the Harlem School of the Arts.
- A. Ethel Carr Watson
- 2. Born in Chicago, Illinois. Served as a French and Spanish correspondence secretary
- B. Jessie McGuire Dent
- 3. The first Black social worker for the New York City and County Charities, and Alpha Chapter's first custodian.
- C. Osceola Macarthy Adams
- 4. The first vice president of Alpha Chapter and the first Black teacher in Richmond County, NY.
- D. Marguerite Young Alexander
- 5. On March 3, 1913, she participated in the Woman's Suffrage March, Delta's first public act as a Sorority. Sixty-eight years later, she repeated this momentous walk on August 2, 1981. D
- E. Madree Penn White
- 6. She was a very gifted singer and actress. She harnessed her vocal powers and sang for television shows.
- F. Olive Claire Jones
- 7. Graduated from Howard in 1913 as valedictorian and class president. She married a founder of Omega Psi Phi.
- G. Eliza Pearl Shippen
- 8. The first corresponding secretary of Alpha Chapter. She became a teacher in the Galveston School District and was instrumental in integrating the schools.
- H. Myra Davis Hemmings
- 9. The first sergeant-at-arms of Alpha Chapter. She helped to charter the graduate chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority in Dallas, Texas.
- I. Edith Motte Young
- 10. Served as president of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, and Alpha Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated,
- J. Bertha Pitts Campbell
- 11. Became a music teacher in the Washington, DC public school system.
- K. Zephyr Chisom Carter
- 12. Helped lobby Delta Sigma Theta to participate in the march for Women's Suffrage.
- L. Frederica Chase Dodd
- 13. Was born in Charlottesville, Virginia, and was an excellent musician. In 1914, she graduated as valedictorian of the Teacher's College.
- M. Mamie Reddy Rose

- 14. Graduated from M Street High School in Washington D.C., later N. Naomi Sewell Richardson known as Dunbar High School, first public high school for Blacks in the United States. 15. The last surviving Founder when she died in 1993 in O. Vashti Turley Murphy Washingtonville, NY. 16. From the small town of Belton, South Carolina. She was the first P. Florence Letcher Toms of the Founders to enter into what is now known as the Omega Omega Chapter 17. The only Founder to receive a doctorate degree and was one of Q. Edna Brown Coleman two Founders who never married. R. Pauline Oberdorfer Minor 18. Introduced First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt to an audience of parents at John Wesley AME Zion Church in 1945. 19. Became a teacher with a career that covered more than thirty S. Ethel Cuff Black years. Following her retirement, she began a second career as a dramatic performer. 20. Published a novel entitled The Valley of the Poor. Her book T. Jimmie Bugg Middleton
- focused on racism and poverty in the South.
- 21. Designed the Sorority pin and served as the second president of Alpha Chapter and Delta Sigma Theta Sorority (1913 - 1919)
- 22. Taught at Claflin College in Orangeburg, SC
