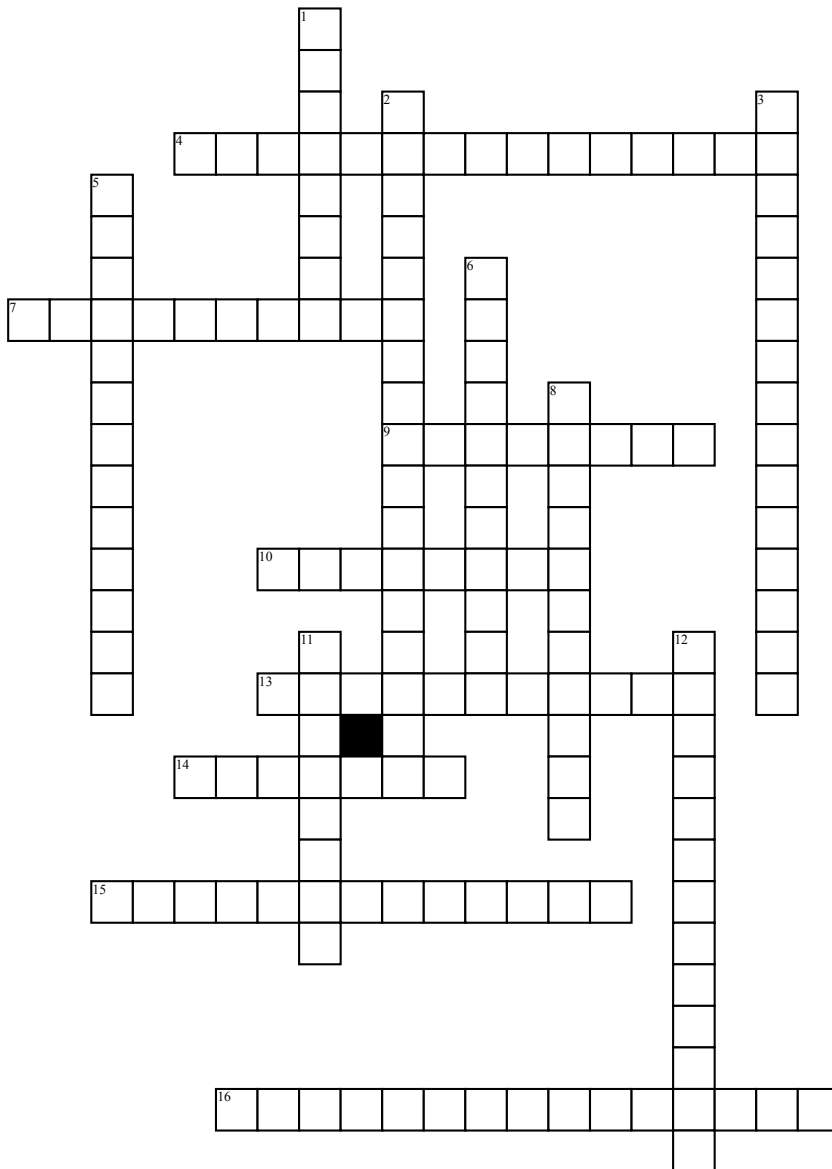


French Revolution Crossword
