

5. a punctuation mark (,) indicating a pause between parts of a sentence. It is also used to separate items in a list and to mark the place of thousands in a large numeral.

8. a form that is derived from a verb but that functions as a noun, in English ending in -ing, e.g., asking in do you mind my asking you?.

9. refers to language that uses words in ways that deviate from their literal interpretation to achieve a more complex or powerful effect.

10. a phrase or clause placed awkwardly in a sentence so that it appears to modify or refer to an unintended word.

1. a grammar term for a verb that connects a subject with a noun or adjective that is the subject.

2. a unit of grammatical organization next below the sentence in rank and in traditional grammar said to consist of a subject and predicate.

3. tells us what the subject of our clause or sentence is doing-physically or mentally.

6. re those whose past tense and past participles are formed by adding a -d or an -ed to the end of the verb.

7. a regular oval shape, traced by a point moving in a plane so that the sum of its distances from two other points (the foci) is constant, or resulting when a cone is cut by an oblique plane which does not intersect the base.
