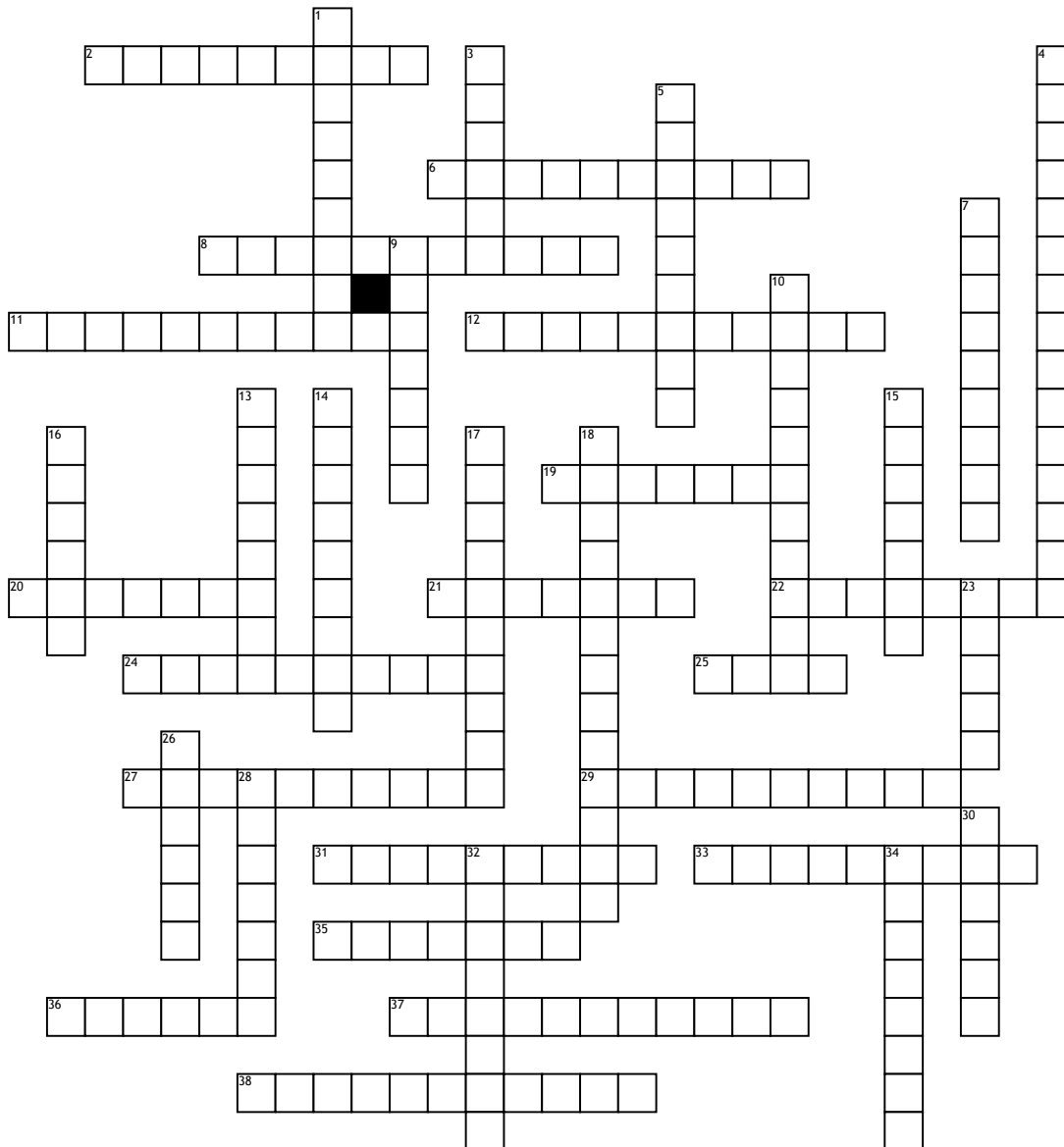


# IT'S ALL ABOUT THE LAW



## Across

2. a Latin term meaning 'compelling law', also called a 'peremptory norm'  
 6. circumstances that make an offence less severe; they can lead to a reduced sentence  
 8. the international treaty that established the International Criminal Court  
 11. recognition under Australian law of the traditional laws and customs of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people,  
 12. the authority of an independent state to govern itself (for example, to make and apply laws; impose and collect taxes; make war and peace; and form treaties with foreign states)  
 19. a legal system that does not deem treaties enforceable domestically until and unless they are incorporated into domestic law  
 20. a relationship where the partners act as a married couple but are not legally married  
 21. a type of forced labour in which a person is considered to be the legal property of another  
 22. mental incapacitation at the time of the act  
 24. having more than one wife or husband at the same time  
 25. a formal statement of guilt or innocence by the accused  
 27. a breach of the duty of reasonable care owed by one party to another

29. a legal presumption in favour of one party - it can be rebutted by the other party if they can show sufficient evidence to disprove it  
 31. the link between the behaviour of the accused and the result  
 33. legal liability of an employer for the wrongful act of another  
 35. the person or alleged offender that criminal action is being taken against  
 36. the process of a state formally approving a treaty, making it legally binding  
 37. a Latin term meaning 'incapable of wrong';  
 38. a Latin term meaning 'a place for standing', also 'standing'

1. something that discourages or is intended to discourage someone from doing something  
 3. a legal system that deems treaties enforceable in domestic law as soon as they have been signed  
 4. an offence where the mens rea does not need to be proved; only the actus reus (the guilty act) needs to be proved  
 5. a Latin term meaning 'guilty act' that refers to the physical act of carrying out a crime  
 7. proceedings in which a magistrate determines if there is enough evidence for a case to proceed to trial in a higher court

9. an attempt or manifest intention to levy war against the state, assist the enemy or cause harm to or the death of a head of state  
 10. the death of a baby under the age of 12 months at the hands of its mother  
 13. dominance of one nation over others  
 14. a Latin term meaning 'outside marriage'  
 15. international statements, such as declarations, that do not create legal obligations for states but do create pressure to act in accordance with them  
 16. the deliberate killing of a person  
 17. a legal presumption in favour of one party that is final and cannot be rebutted by the other party  
 18. in criminal matters, the responsibility of the prosecution to prove the case against the accused  
 23. International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights  
 26. a period spent in custody awaiting trial  
 28. when one or more people intentionally take another person's property without consent and without intention of returning it  
 30. in bail, where another person agrees to provide a financial guarantee that the accused will return to the court for trial in exchange for the accused's release until that date  
 32. a final decree of the dissolution of marriage
