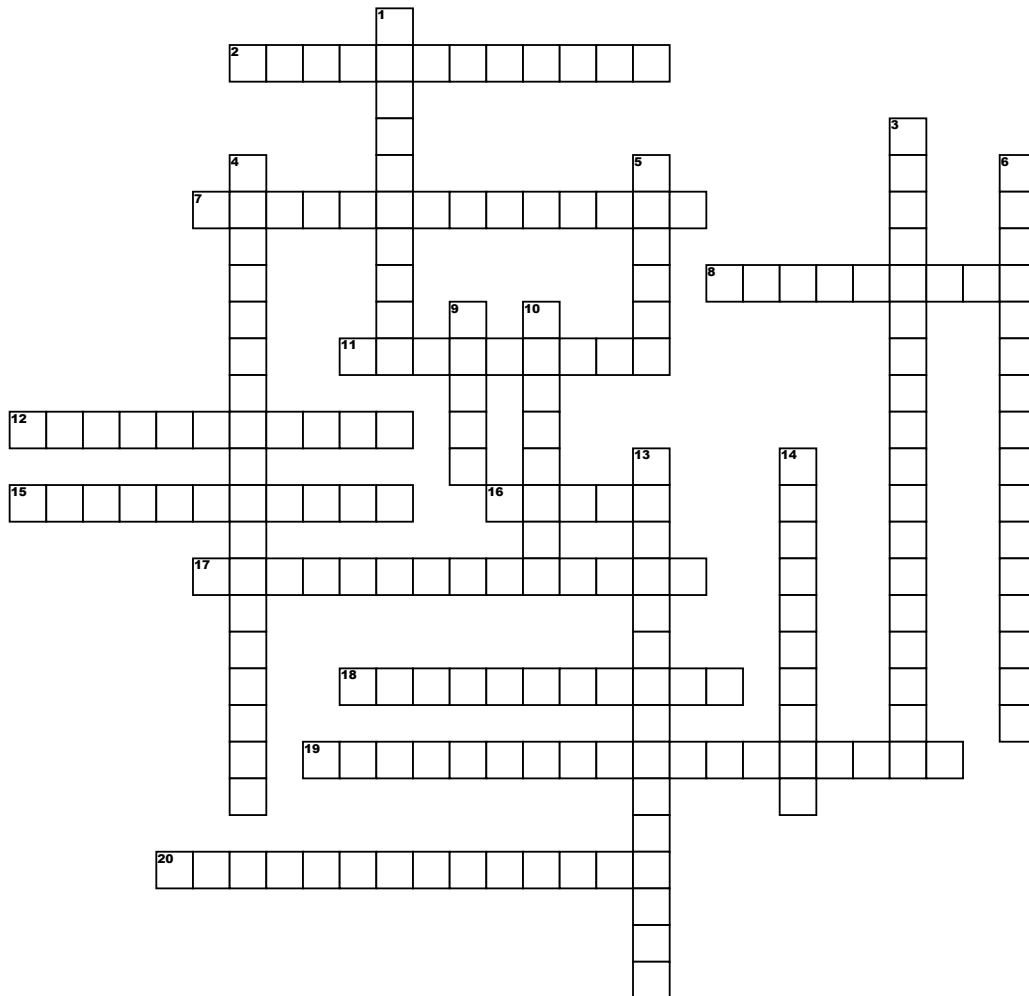

- 14. Literary device used to give an indication or hint of what is to come later in the story.
