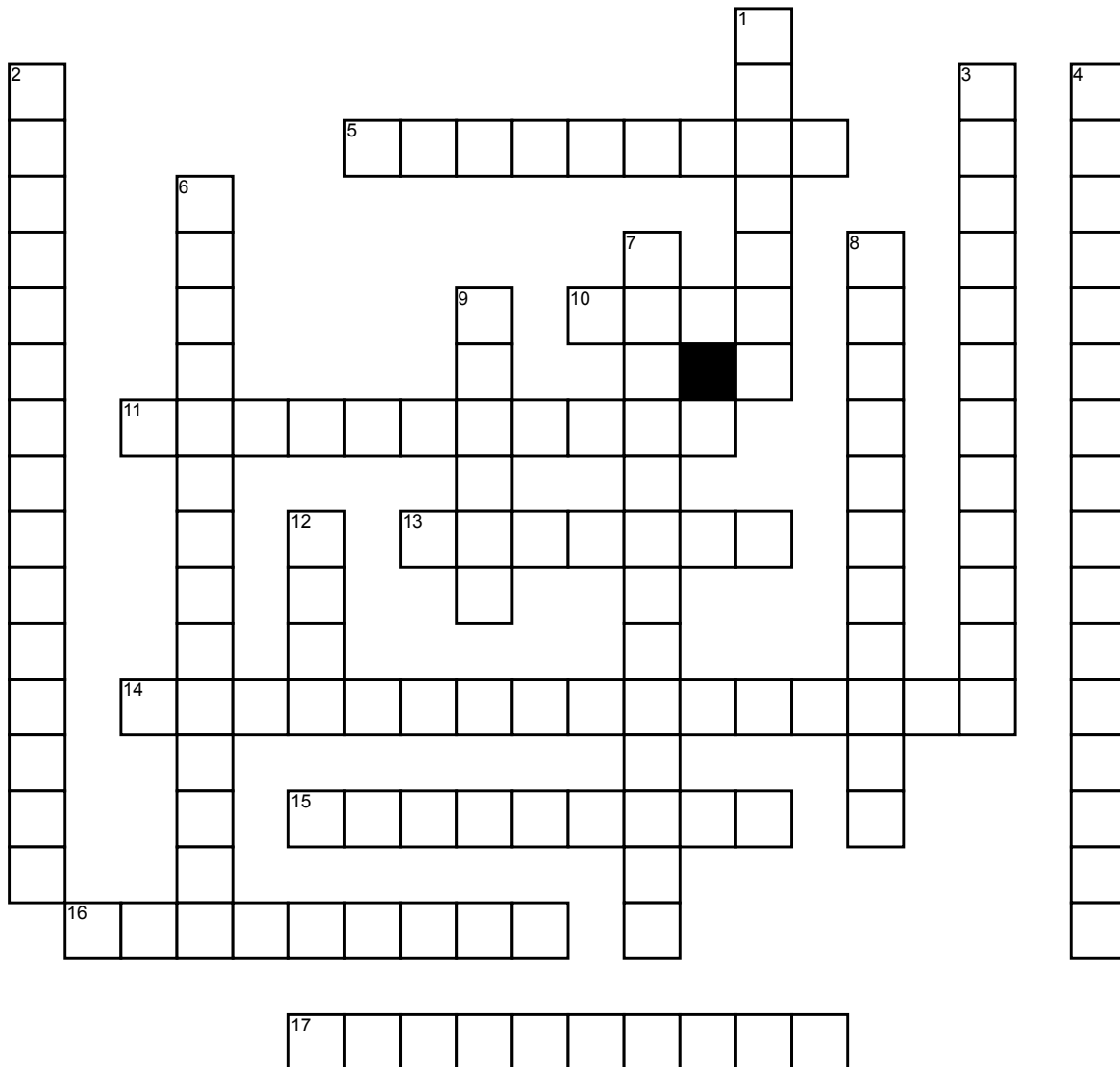


# Literature Vocabulary



## Across

**5.** a teacher picks up a book, reads the title aloud and begins to read while students listen quietly

**10.** students create this in order to examine information they have learned about a specific topic; used to explore a topic from six dimensions or perspectives

**11.** where students write entries to about new concepts they are learning, record new and interesting words, make charts and diagrams, and reflect on their learning

**13.** backdrop for the story; where the story takes place

**14.** a type of reading done for the purpose of enjoyment or pleasure

**15.** a written account of a person's life written by someone other than that person

**16.** a type of spelling instruction that is based on learning word patterns rather than memorizing unconnected words

**17.** the people or personified animals within a story; most significant element in a story structure

**1.** a web like organizer where students organize information they have collected

**2.** a type of reading done for the purpose of understanding a message or remembering important information

**3.** refers to when students read or reread a selection with a peer or classmate

**4.** small groups of students get together to read and respond to a piece of literature

**6.** a type of interactive level activity where students read scripts expressively

**7.** an account of a person's life written by that person

**8.** the particular viewpoint that a story is written; includes first person, omniscient, limited omniscient and objective
