


Logical Fallacies

- 3. "Domino theory" and "ripple affect" aka one thing leads to another
- 5. Assuming casual relationships between two events based solely on the two events happening close in time, or "after this, therefore because of this."
- 8. Comparing two things as though they are actually alike when they have key features that are different.
- 9. Claiming that a position is valid because it hasn't been proven wrong
- 10. Purposely misinterpreting or mistaking an opponents argument as a way to make it easier to denigrate or attack

- 1. The fallacy of composition arises when one infers that something is true of the whole from the fact that is true of some part of the whole
- 2. Claiming that a statement/argument is more valid because it comes from an authority figure
- 4. Bringing up irrelevant issues that have more emotional appeal than the real issues in order to divert attention away from the point
- 6. Attacking someone personally while criticizing them in a totally different arena
- 7. Claiming that the majority opinion must be the correct opinion
