

15. Meaning growing, as in a swelling of sound, or becoming louder.

17. In sheet music, a symbol at the beginning of the staff defining the pitch of the notes found in that particular staff.

Diction

1. A symbol that tells the performer to hold the note as long as s/he would like, but certainly longer than the written note value. 2. Vocal expression : enunciation. b : pronunciation and enunciation of words in singing.

3. A group of pitches based on a particular tonic, and comprising a scale, regarded as forming the tonal basis of a piece or section of music.

6. A written note with a dot to the right of it (the dot adds half the rhythmic duration to the note's original value)

7. The simultaneous combination of pitches, especially when blended into chords that are pleasing to the ear.

9. The lowest male voice

10. A musical symbol that raises the pitch one half-step

11. The frequency of a note determining how high or low it sounds

12. A low-ranged female voice; the second lowest instrumental range
