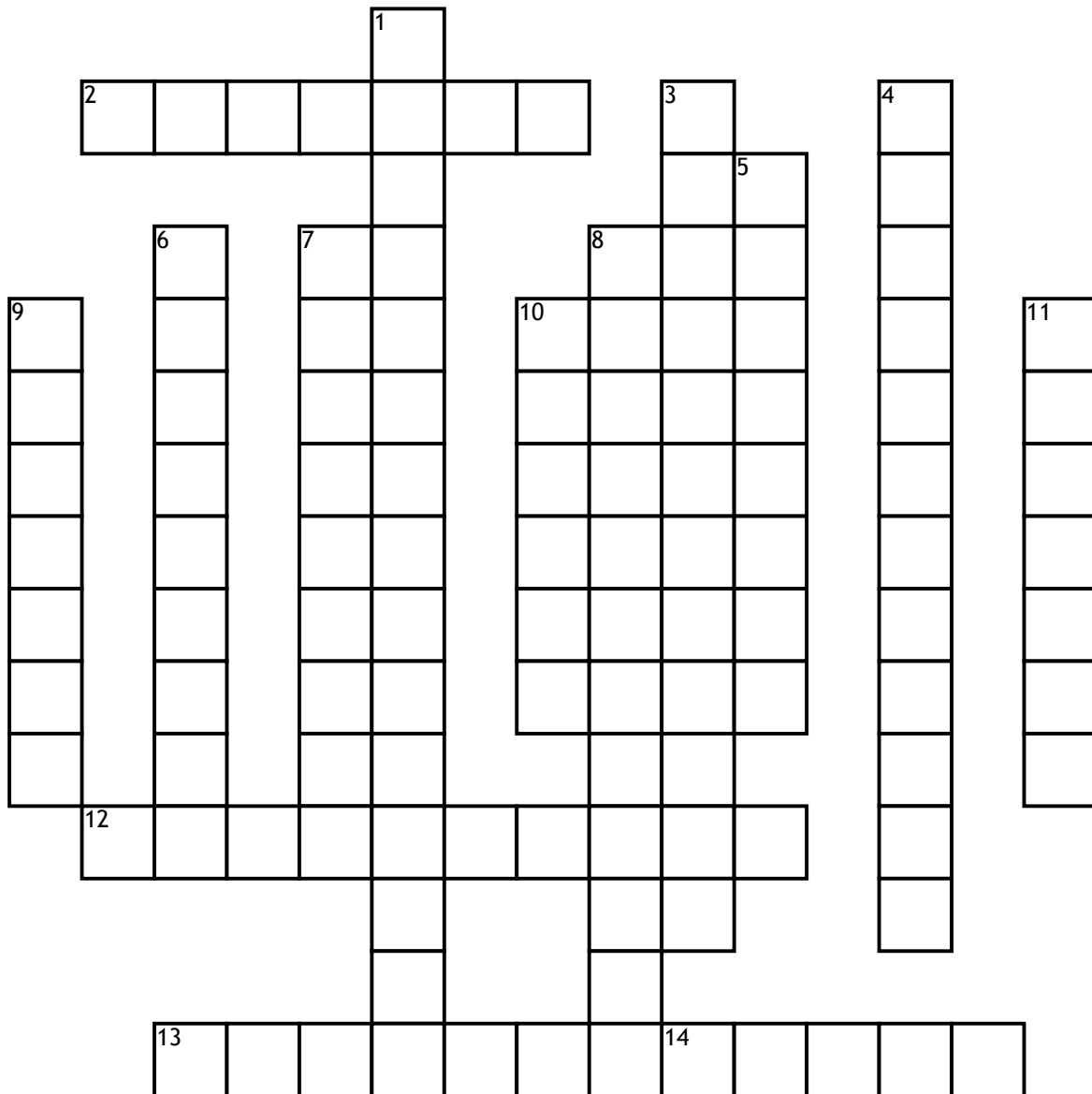

1. A figure of speech which endows animals, ideas, or inanimate objects with human traits or abilities

3. The repetition of initial consonant sounds

6. An extreme exaggeration. It's not meant to be literally true.

7. Words that sound the same but are spelt different.

9. A word that is spelt the same but has a different meaning.

10. A comparison between two objects using a specific word or comparison such as "like", "as", or "than"
