
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Poetic Devices

- 7. Words and phrases that appeal to the five senses. Poets use imagery to create a picture in the reader's mind or to remind the reader of a familiar sensation.
- **8.** The message about life that the poem conveys.
- 11. A figure of speech in which words are used in such a way that their intended meaning is different from the actual meaning of the words.
- **12.** Dominant feeling the poet feel towards the subject.

- **13.** Repeating sounds, words, phrases, or whole lines in a poem.
- 14. Deliberate repetition of initial consonant sounds, e.g., "She sold seashells by the seashore"
- **15.** A comparison of two unlike things not using "as" or "like"; implied comparison.

- 1. A group of lines forming the basic recurring metrical unit in a poem; a verse.
- 2. A comparison of two unlike things using "as" or "like", e.g. "Her hair is as bright as the sun."

- **3.** Repetition of consonant sounds, e.g., "The chalk fell into the crack in the rock."
- **4.** Exaggeration for dramatic effect
- **5.** Giving an animal or an object human qualities or motives.
- **6.** Use of words resembling the sounds they mean, e.g., biz buzz, humming, pant and puff.
- **9.** Words that end with the same sound.
- **10.** Deliberate repetition of identical or similar vowel sound, e.g., "the tread of the feet of the dead".
