

- **6.** a comparison between two ideas or objects by implying one is the other
- **9.** a comparison between two ideas or objects using the words 'like' or 'as'
- 11. when a line of poetry is interrupted by punctuation rather than leaving the punctuation to the end of the line
- **14.** repetition of the same vowel sounds within words or a line
- **16.** usually an image or object to represent meanings other than its obvious/literal meaning
- 17. a word which mimics the sound the word describes
- **18.** using contrast between two ideas, people or objects usually to emphasise a quality (or lack of) in one thing

- **19.** two words together which are opposing ideas
- **20.** words or phrases which depict a visual image for the reader

- 2. the continuation of a sentence without a pause beyond the end of a line, couplet, or stanza
- 3. to overstate or over-exaggerate to produce a grand or comic effect
- 4. words at the end of lines of poetry whose endings have the same sound
- **5.** the use of an element, subject, idea or concept which is repeated through a text in order to develop a theme. Unlike symbols, motifs can evolve in meaning in a text
- 7. presenting an inanimate object with qualities usually associated with people

- **8.** repetition of the same sound at the beginning of words
- **10.** repeating the same sound, image, word or line
- **12.** a pattern of beats (meter) within a poem usually produced by putting emphasis on certain syllables
- 13. presenting people, objects or ideas with qualities usually associated with animals
- **15.** repetition of 's' sounds within a word or line
