
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Repetition Literary Devices as of January 29th

- **3.** Repetition of words at the start of clauses or verses.
- **5.** Repetition of words or phrases in opposite sense.
- **7.** Repetition of a phrase (usually a question) to stress a point.
- **8.** Repetition of the same words at the beginning and the end of a sentence.
- **10.** Repetition of words broken by some other words.

- **11.** A combination of anaphora and epiphora, in which repetition is both at the end and at the beginning.
- **12.** A literary device wherein the last word of one clause becomes the first of the next, and so on. An extension of anadiplosis.
- **13.** Repetition of similar or identical vowel sounds in neighboring words.

1. Repetition of an idea first in negative terms, and then in positive terms.

- **2.** Repetition of the same word at the end of each clause.
- **4.** The occurrence of the same letter or sound at the beginning of adjacent or closely connected words.
- **6.** Repetition of words of the same root, with different endings.
- **9.** Repetition of the last word in a line or clause.
