24. An assisted-braking belay device.

1. A powdery substance that absorbs humidity when applied to the hands.

2. A small hold with space for less than 1 finger pad.

3. A large hold on which the climber must rely on friction between the hold and the climber's open hand.


4. The sequence of moves on a climb (Can vary from climber to climber).
