

- 16. As its name suggests, the omniscient POV is one that tells its story from the perspective of a narrator (usually-implicitly-the author himself) who "knows all and sees all." This narrator is rarely characterized or explained, and readers accept this without ever wondering who is telling the story.

- 22. The use of irony to mock or convey contempt.
- **24.** a comparison of two otherwise unlike things based on resemblance of a particular aspect
