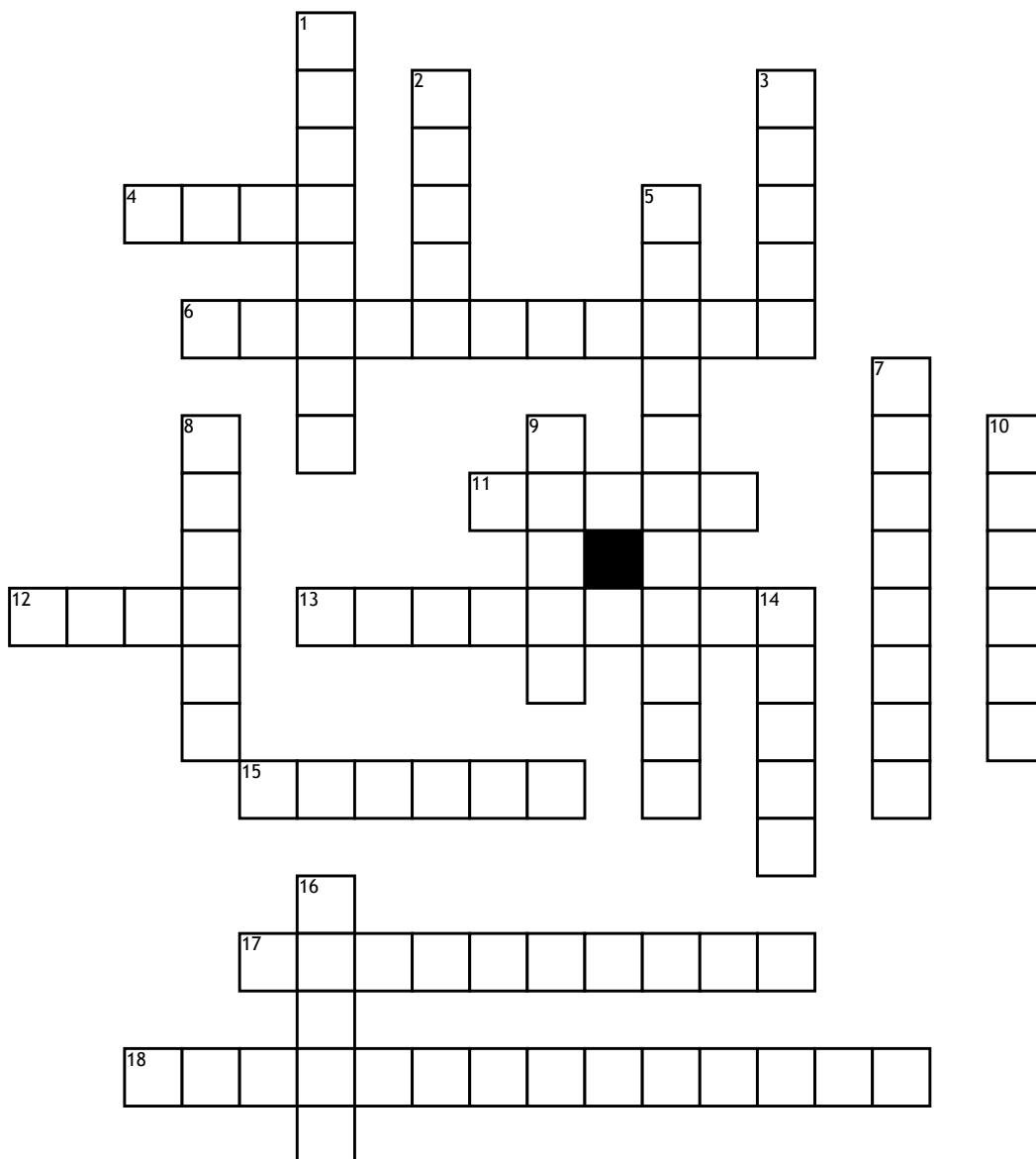

17. The statement in an argument which is supported or implied by the premise(s)

18. another syllogism of the same form as the original, with obviously true premises and a false conclusion

1. the statement(s) in an argument which support or imply the conclusion
 2. the subject term of the conclusion, used in one premise
 3. a syllogism in which the conclusion is necessarily true given that the premises are true
 5. The type of deductive argument consisting of 3 statements in categorical form

7. A set of statements, one of which appears to be implied or supported by the others

8. the term found once in each premise, and is not in the conclusion at all

9. the premise which contains the major term

10. a representation of a syllogism with statements in standard order and standard abbreviations of the terms

14. the premise which contains the minor term

16. a syllogism which is valid AND has true premises
