1. Words spoken by a character to the audience rather than
to the other characters, who supposedly DO NOT hear the
speech

2. The quick shutting off of all the stage lights

- 3. The instructions that actors use to know exactly where they are supposed to be on stage at all times
- C. Troupe
- 4. When an actor auditions for a role without having read the script beforehand
- D. Blocking
- 5. The cast and crew of a show and any other staff who work on the show
- E. Cue
- 6. Signals that are given to the actors, the crew, the musicians and any others working on a show
- F. Strike
- 7. A run-through with all technical elements, including costumes and make-up.
- G. Dress Rehearsal
- 8. A group of actors, singers or dancers who perform together on stage
- H. Ensemble
- 9. Pieces of canvas or plywood attached to wooden frames, painted and linked together, to create walls and doors on stage.
- I. House
- 10. The actor's ability to perform in a show over and over while making it appear that the dialogue and situations are happening for the first time.
- J. Sightlines

11. The place where the audience sits
