

- 3. Popular sovereignty or the sovereignty of the people's rule is the principle that the authority of a state and its government is created and sustained by the consent of its people, through their elected representatives (Rule by the People), who are the source of all political power.
- 4. The legislative branch is the part of the United States government that creates laws. Whenever you read about congresspeople in the Senate or House debating a law, you're reading about the legislative branch: the branch of the government that writes, debates, and passes laws. Making laws can be called legislating.
- 5. The judicial branch is the part of the U.S. government that interprets the law and administers justice. You know how judging is making a decision? The judicial branch of the U.S. government makes decisions interpretations of laws.
