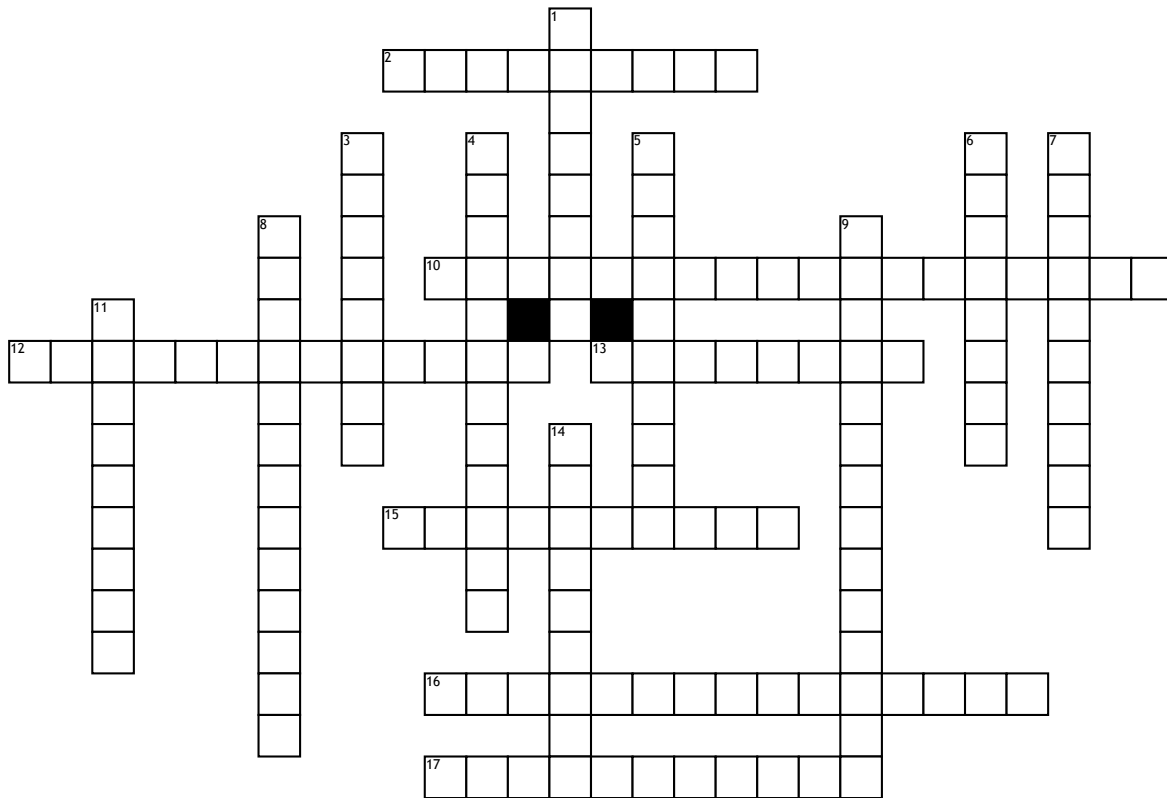

1. a follower or supporter of a group or political party, especially a person who shows a biased, emotional allegiance

3. conduct or language inciting rebellion against authority of a state or country

4. a writ requiring a person to be brought before a judge or court; used to protect against illegal imprisonment

5. T. Roosevelt's 1904 presidential campaign slogan pledging fair treatment for business, workers, and the public

6. exclusive control, such as in trade or industry, that eliminates competition

7. imprisonment or forced relocation of a group of people; ex. Japanese Americans after Pearl Harbor

8. Article 1, section 8 grants Congress the power to pass all laws necessary to carry out their list of powers.

9. philosophical argument that individuals unite into political societies to protect one another from violence or other harm

11. an economic system in which investment in and ownership of the means of production, distribution and exchange of wealth is controlled entirely by the government

14. a political scandal around the break-in of Democratic Headquarters; led to the resignation of President Nixon
