

- **1.** Similarity of structure in a pair or series of related words, phrases, or clauses
- **4.** A form of expression used to convey meaning or heighten effect
- **5.** Juxtaposition of contrasting words or ideas (often, though not always, in parallel structure
- **6.** repetition of the same word or clause after intervening matter, More strictly, repetition at the end of a line, phrase, or clause of the word or words that occurred at the beginning of the same line, phrase, or clause
- 7. Generally, the arrangement of words, phrases, or clauses in an order of increasing importance, often in parallel structure
- **9.** Ending a series of lines, phrases, clauses, sentences, or with the same word or words

- **10.** The omission of conjunctions between clauses, often resulting in a hurried rhythm or vehement effect
- **11.** Employing many conjunctions between clauses, often slowing the tempo or rhythm

- **14.** Repetition of words, in successive clauses, reverse grammatical order
- **18.** The repetition of the last word from the previous line, clause, or sentence at the beginning of the next
