

- 3. The level of proof required to establish a case. In criminal law, the prosecution must prove that the accused is guilty beyond reasonable doubt.
- **5.** A set of rules that determines the structure of government and its law-making powers
- **10.** A situation where a legally binding agreement is not honoured by one or more of the parties to the contract
- 12. A law made by Parliament
- **13.** To take legal action against another person for a criminal offence
- **16.** Law developed by judges through the decisions of courts
- **17.** A process of allowing the people to vote on an important issue, such as a proposed change to the Constitution
- **19.** Where Indigenous Australian peoples believe that their customary laws originated

- **20.** The party in a civil or criminal trial against whom an action has been brought
- **21.** The legal principle describing who has to prove a case in court. In a criminal trial, this burden is on the prosecution.
- **22.** A tort (civil wrong) involving direct and intentional interference with a person, or a person's land or goods
- 23. A law passed by Parliament
- **24.** In a criminal trial, a randomly selected group of people who decide the guilt or innocence of an accused person
- **25.** The person who commences a legal action in civil law

- 1. A court official who hears cases in the lowest court in the legal system
- **2.** The main political party in the lower house of parliament not in power
- **4.** Refers to laws that have been collected and organised, usually in written form

- **6.** An organisation of employees formed for mutual support, and to seek improvements in pay and working conditions for its members
- 7. Laws made by parliament
- **8.** Guidelines for behaviour developed by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples
- **9.** An agreement between two or more countries to carry out certain actions. It is usually legally binding on those countries.
- **11.** A legal principle developed by a court in the process of resolving a dispute
- 14. The Queen's authority in the Australian parliament, represented by the Governor-General at the federal level and a Governor at the state level
- **15.** A situation where a person breaches a duty to exercise reasonable care to avoid a foreseeable risk, resulting in another person being injured or suffering a risk of injury
- **18.** A form of government in which the people determine how they will be governed
