

- **5.** part of a play defined by elements such as rising action, climax and resolution
- **6.** character briefly says something to himself or whispers to another character so other characters on stage cannot hear him or her
- **7.** An introduction or preface, especially a poem recited to introduce a play.
- 10. the place and time where the events of the drama take place; in a play it dominates the audience's experience of the drama. It quite literally forms the backdrop for the action.
- 11. someone whose tragic flaw causes him/her to have a downfall and learn from the consequences of his actions.
- **12.** a character is talking to himself on stage, allowing the audience access to his or her thoughts (alone on stage)
- 1. a flaw in the tragic hero of a tragedy that brings the tragic hero to ruin or sorrow; also known as a tragic flaw.
- **2.** an instruction written into the script of a play, indicating stage actions, movements of performers, or production requirements
- 3. a long speech (at least 10 lines) by one character to a group (everyone can hear the person speaking)
- **4.** a humorous character or incident in a serious literary work or drama, especially a tragedy, intended to relieve the dramatic tension
- **8.** a part of an act defined with the changing of characters or setting
- **9.** A tragedy is a play which tells the story of a tragic hero. Shakespearean tragedies usually begin fine and dandy, but quickly go downhill.
